Siemens invests in Marine Current Turbines

Marine Current Turbines Press Release (extract) - 25th February

Marine Current Turbines is pleased to announce that global engineering firm, Siemens, has invested in the firm alongside the Carbon Trust, High Tide and other private investors.

Following an investment round led by the Carbon Trust in 2009, this latest funding brings the total investment in Marine Current Turbines over the past two months to £8.5million. Investors in the first round included Bank Invest, Carbon Trust, EDF Energy and High Tide.

Lord Hunt, Minister of State for the UK Department of Energy and Climate Change welcomed the new £4.8million funding round saying: "Our seas are a fantastic asset that can generate clean, green and home-grown power that will boost our transition to a low carbon economy. I'm pleased that more investors are coming forward to back Marine Current Turbines as they seek to harness the UK's excellent tidal resources."

£10 million for Bristol's SPark – one of the UK's biggest science parks

SWRDA Press Release (extract) - 23rd February

An extra £10 million for SPark, the much anticipated £300 million science park for Bristol and Bath, has been announced today, in preparation for work to start on site this spring.

Combined with the initial funding, this is the South West RDA's largest single investment, and means that subject to final contractual agreements, the first phase can get underway on the Emersons Green site to create one of the UK's biggest science parks.

Once complete, SPark will bring over 6000 skilled Research & Development jobs, in over 77,000 sq m (820,000 sq ft) of new research

facilities on the 22 hectare site. It is anticipated the construction of SPark will involve over 1,500 man-years of work.

Bristol employment specialists expands

Bristol employment specialist The HR Dept has expanded into new premises as a result of winning new business.

A Bristol web design company has been selected to host an international software conference that is expected to attract 500 delegates from more than 30 countries.

It is the first time the Plone Conference will have come to the city. Previously it has been held in New Orleans, Vienna, Seattle, Naples and Washington.

"As Bristol is a leading city in the world of digital media, it is great to be able to host the

conference here," said Matt Hamilton, who runs the business, Netsight Internet Solutions, of Berkeley Square, Clifton. "It is a coup for the city."

Members of his 13 staff will be organising various aspects of the conference in October.

Mr Hamilton set up his company 10 years ago after studying computer science at Bristol University.

It is used by organisations as diverse as Nasa, Oxfam, eBay, the University of Oxford and Warwickshire Police.

New football stadium gets final approval from Bristol City Council

Plans for a multi-million pound development of Bristol City Football Club’s new stadium were given approval this evening by the city’s council Development Control Committee.

Because the development includes Green Belt land the application will now be referred to Government Office to allow the Secretary of State to consider if the application should be “called-in” for his decision.

Joy at Airbus as it lands a plane contract ‘worth \$1bn’

Plane –maker Airbus has landed a contract for new aircraft worth an estimated \$1.1 billion which will directly benefit the aerospace industry in the South West.

The six A330s will be part built at the firm’s factory in Filton and have been ordered at a time when most airlines are canceling or delaying orders for new planes.

Yesterday the company revealed that Hong Kong Airlines had signed a memorandum of understanding for six A330-200 aircraft.

The latest deal means the airline, which is planning to expand its operations in the Far East, is now planning to take on a total of 23 new A330s.

Bristol music shop has its tills ringing

A music shop is on the move as part of an expansion that will see it operating from bigger premises. Hobgoblin Music at College Green will move a few hundred yards up the road to a bigger shop on Park Street from next month.

Manager Cris Pierssene said: "We have just had our best year ever as a business and we believe it is because people are turning to music in these tough times for fun and to cheer themselves up.

"It is the traditional, fairly inexpensive instruments that have been selling well, such as ukuleles, guitars and penny whistles. But we are also seeing significant increases in sales of more expensive instruments such as fiddles and accordions.

"The new shop will be bigger and better enabling us to expand our entire range. There will be a new music books section and we will have room for an instrument repairs service."

The new Hobgoblin Music shop will be the largest in the eight-shop chain, which also has stores in Birmingham, Crawley, Leeds, London, Manchester, Wadebridge and Milton Keynes.

A Matter of Loaf and Death, Wallace & Gromit's fourth short film, has made the final selection of nominees for Best Animated Short Film at the 82nd Academy Awards, held on 7th March 2010.

This is the fifth Oscar nomination for the pair, of which they have won three to date, with A Grand Day Out, their first outing in 1989, only just missing out to Creature Comforts, Nick Park's second short film entry that year!

Both The Wrong Trousers (1993) and A Close Shave (1995) secured the Oscar for Best Animated Short Film, and Wallace & Gromit's first feature film, The Curse of the WereRabbit, took home the Academy Award for Best Animated Feature in 2006. Therefore, Nick Park has won a staggering total of FOUR Oscars already!
